Followed by Ms. Thilagavathi, an advocate in Madras High Court, spoke about where we stand in Gender Equality.

Finally, the program successfully ended with valediction done by Mr. Kannan, Joint General Secretary of CITU. The seminar had enlightened students, research scholars, academicians and professional social workers to advance human rights in our society by taking appropriate action.
